
## CAPI individual questionnaire

# Auxiliary timeline for respondent's employment history



## **Compulsory military service**

 In the timeline, mark the years the respondent was doing compulsory military service (if applicable).

## Maternity (parental) leave

- How many periods of maternity, parental leave has the respondent had? I.e., how many times have they stayed at home after having a baby to care for the baby and did not work for pay at that time.
- Count multiple consecutive maternity (parental) leaves pertaining to children born after one another as a single spell.
- In the timeline, mark the respective years.

#### Jobs lasting more than 1 year


- How many jobs lasting at least a year has the respondent had?
- In the timeline, mark when they started and quitted these jobs. Do not count taking maternity (parental) leave from work as quitting a job.

#### **Unemployment spells**

- How many unemployment spells have the respondent had in their life and how many of them lasted at least 6 months?
- In the timeline, mark the years the respondent was unemployed for at least 6 months.

## Example one, female, 48 years old

Jane (48) started her first job in 1986 (as a worker in a cooperative farm). She left the job before giving birth to her son and took maternity leave between 1988 and 1992. Then, she took up the position of a cook in a school canteen, staying there until 1999. In the meantime, she took maternity leave with her second child between 1994 and 1998. Then she returned to her previous job and, in 1999, started as a bookkeeper with a textile firm. She stayed at home with her third child from 2004 to 2007. The textile firm went out of business at the beginning of 2011, leaving Jane unemployed for 7 months until she found a job as an administrative officer still in 2011. She has been working there ever since.



## Example two, male, 51 years old

Lukas (51) did his military service between 1983 and 1985. After that, he started his first job as a public transit bus driver. In 1992, he switched to being a long-haul truck driver in a transport company, working there ever since. Lukas has never been unemployed, nor has he been on parental leave.
